

# Water, Water Everywhere

Water, Water, Everywhere I would never have expected it, but this recent miserable overflowing no fishing no beach no barbeque muddy mosquito-infested sump pump Summer bestowed a bit of short-term optimism on me. Five or six years of Connecticut drought is truly over and our tiny, hidden, imperiled Brook Trout caught a break.

I was feeling seriously depressed. I just reread "The Trout Pool Paradox" by George Black. Published in 2004, it glowingly describes the stocking of Atlantic Salmon in rivers that once held those natives, and enthuses about the cleanup of the Naugatuck, a court order that Waterbury must leave some water in the Shepaug for trout, and the brand-new natural flow regime on the Housatonic. We know what happened to those efforts. The salmon are fun but are a brief artificial Fall entertainment only. There is still no stocking of trout in the Shepaug. The Housatonic, as well as our local Shetucket, run on natural flow — which usually leaves one week in June and some of autumn as the extent of feasible trout fishing. Maybe far less this year. Are we supposed to root for drought again? And don't get me started on the mayfly extinctions.

We all know and accept that trout fishing in Connecticut, indeed the whole Northeast, is generally a manufactured experience. The Farmington is an excellent holdover fishery, but it exists by virtue of a bottom-release dam, and no natural reproduction takes place in the river. The wild trout live in New York, Vermont, and Pennsylvania, and let's face it, those Browns

come from Germany and Scotland. Aye, laddie. Truth is, no river anywhere hereabouts has a self-sustaining population of trout large enough for the number of anglers that descend on it if trout are allowed to be taken.

OK, optimism. Ground water will now fill our aquifers for a while, seeping out at 60 degrees during next summer's heat into rocky little streams and brooks, just when native Brook Trout and some now-native Brown Trout need it the most. It should help for at least a few years. I don't chase these pretty little trout around; I suspect few of you do. It's just nice to know they are there. Higher water late this year even gives trout a chance to expand their territory during spawning season. Colder water will be seeping into all our larger streams as well, helping to keep stocked catchable-sized browns, brookies, and rainbows happier and healthier for longer. The mission of TU is to save native trout and their habitats; the angling part of the equation is the DEEP's bailiwick.



We think of New England as supporting Brook Trout and Atlantic Salmon throughout geologic history, way back to the Ice Age 12,000 years ago. That's arguable. Europeans arrived during another cold spell, the Little Ice Age, which lasted from 1300 or so to 1850/1900. Plenty of CT salmonids during that stretch, but no real evidence that they were indigenous before then. Just as flora and fauna populations are shifting north now, fish populations probably always shifted north and south as well.

As for the rest of our beat-up ecosystem:

Each frog, toad, and salamander also has a new lease on life, as do the snakes, birds, and mammals that depend on them for food. Late blooming flowers and shrubs probably produced a lot of seeds, good for the birds now and good for next year's new growth. Deer and turkeys may have a bit more to eat during the winter. I saw a lot of Milkweed – maybe Monarch butterflies got a boost too. And it looks like any remaining bats didn't have trouble finding mosquitoes to eat.

We may feel desperate to act, to do something to save our trout before it's too late. I'm as stressed as anyone. But Mother Nature always has the last word, and it takes patience to see and understand the long view. Teddy Roosevelt famously quoted a friend: "Do what you can, with what you have, where you are." Let's keep trying, and maybe we'll even get to fish again this year too.

# CT DEEP 2021 Fall Stocking Update

Summer is winding down and once water temperatures are adequate, we will begin stocking about 54,000 trout in waterbodies near you! We will stock 63 locations this fall including trout parks, trout management areas, community fishing waters, and other popular waters as well as Atlantic Salmon management areas. Follow us here (current Stocking Report) or check our interactive trout stocking map for stocking updates.

The following is the fall allocation: 20,000 Rainbow trout (10-12 inches) 10,000 Rainbow trout (> 12 inches) 10,000 Tiger trout (10-12 inches) 500 Tiger trout (> 12 inches) 1,000 Brook Trout (> 14 inches) 6,000 >12" Seeforellen brown trout 4,000 >12" Survivor brown trout 2,500 > 12" Cortland brown trout 1,200 2+ (about 14-18") Atlantic salmon 260 3+ (about 22-24") Atlantic salmon



Each spring and fall chapter volunteers assist the state DEEP to stock area streams. Many of our members volunteer. In the spring and fall we float stock streams using floating live carts to distribute the fish. This involves wading up to a mile downstream. 
