The Kootenai and Yaak rivers of northwestern Montana don't get the recognition that others in the state like the Madison and the Missouri do. This is actually a good thing. Imagine five days of fishing from a drift boat without seeing another one on the river or wading miles and miles of a crystal clear alpine stream and never seeing a soul. That's what fishing is like on the Kootenai River and the Yaak drainage with the Linehan Outfitting Company. Presentation is entirely videobased.

Tim Flagler is the owner of Tightline Productions, L.L.C., a video production company located in Califon, NJ. Although he produces video programs over a wide range of topics, his specialty is fly fishing. Tim is a well-known fly tying instructor. His YouTube videos are some of the best in the business and his YouTube channel, <a href="mailto:practicalpatterns.com">practicalpatterns.com</a> currently has over 92,000 subscribers and almost 28 million views. Almost every week he produces a new fly tying or "how to" video which appear not only on his YouTube channel but on Midcurrent and the Orvis fly fishing blog as well. They're also featured on Trout Unlimited's national website and in the Orvis Learning Center. In addition, he has a regular column "Beginner's Masterclass with Tim Flagler" in Fly Tyer magazine. Many of his tying videos take the viewer well beyond just the tying of the fly and show what it looks like underwater, what natural it represents and how it can be fished.

Tim's a fixture at the Fly Fishing Shows - giving presentations, teaching classes and often as a Featured Tier. He enjoys guiding year round for Shannon's Fly & Tackle in Califon, NJ. and hosts annual trips to Patagonia in the spring and to the Kootenai River in MT starting summer of 2020.

# A Tribute to Dick Tremblay

Some of you may know the gentleman I am going to tell you stories about, Dick Tremblay. He lived in Putnam his entire life except for a brief but important few years as a Marine fighting in Viet Nam in the early 70's, while I was in high school and college. He told me stories of getting on his bike as a kid and going to the local streams around Putnam to fish. Many spots he fished have since turned into strip malls and homes, etc. He became an electrician after his military service and owned Tremblay Electric in Putnam. If you live in that



area, he may have wired your house. He was one of the chief

electricians at the Woodstock Fair for many, many years. I'm not sure if Dick was currently a member of Thames Valley TU, but he was a member off and on for decades.

Dick Tremblay passed away on Father's Day 2022. The photo is of Dick on Pachaug Pond a few days before his passing.

Everything encircled in yellow is bait fish. There were miles of the stuff in Oct right up against the beach. We would just wade on the outside of the pod and catch fish cast after cast. They called them "red bait".



I met Dick Tremblay when he walked into a saltwater fishing club meeting 20+ years ago and wanted to be included in our email fishing report list which I monitored. He had seen someone at the Woodstock Fair with a club hat and decided he wanted to join. It was the best thing that ever happened to that club. Day 1 he told the President "I will do the worst job for you, the job no one else volunteers for, so you can take that off your to do list. BUT I will only do it for 1 year." That unwanted job was fly tying coordinator. Years later he was President.

He soon met Joe "Canz" Canzanella and the two became fast friends. They both had a real calling to develop fun outings and tournaments for the club. As things evolved the tournaments became more fun with team names and mottos. "Team Pheromone – We stink and you love it." Dick and Joe were "Team Cream Puff".

Team Cream Puff would put their skill up against Team Coho for several years straight in the Buzzards Bay Shoot Out. With prize money on the line Team Cream Puff would continually win. At Dick's wake was a plaque showing the prize money all signed by the participants with photos. He never spent the winnings. Dick was about the fun of fishing and the memories: Team Cream Puff 52 vs. Team Coho 31.

He coordinated 3 trips to Destin Florida, in the panhandle, for red fish. 4 friends joined on each trip. Trip #1 we got the high-rise condo, on the beach Dick had arranged, dropped our gear and Bob and I decided to take a look at the beach. Climbing up the dune to the beach we took one look and our jaws dropped. We did an immediate U-turn back up to the room for the fly rods. Dick and John asked what we were doing. We muttered "look out the window" and on the 5<sup>th</sup> floor you could see the beach clearly. Dick and John were 10 feet behind us as the 4 of us hit the beach. The photo Dick later edited says it all. That is John Crowe, past president of Thames Valley TU in the foreground and I'm the speck on the horizon.

We also would hire a guide on those Destin trips. The Second Picture is of Dick with a red fish and me with a False Albacore on the guide's boat.

On our second trip to Destin Dick got the same condo and we arrived just in time to greet a hurricane bearing down on our condo. During the downtime sitting out the storm the 4 of us found a restaurant near the condo called Louisiana Lagniappe. Excellent meals and I had a bread pudding for dessert that was outstanding. I told Dick, "You gotta try this." In return I got a 10-minute expose on how he HATED bread pudding. "no one knows how to make it, too soggy, too dry." Finally, once his mouth stopped resisting, he tried a bite and ordered one for himself. (More on this topic later).



A year or two later Dick wanted to try for red fish in the Mississippi delta region. He

coordinated a trip to Venice, Louisiana at the mouth of the Mississippi southeast of New Orleans. With guides we caught lots of red fish, I also caught a black drum (red fish are just red drums) and a large jack crevalle.

Just outside Venice we found a local restaurant for dinner. Chuck and I ordered a seafood stuffed baked potato which included a side salad of choice. The waitress came back and said the kitchen was out of lettuce, would we like potato salad or coleslaw. In my infinite wisdom I selected potato salad and Chuck agreed. Not realizing what we were in for. Potato salad to start then a stuffed potato larger than your head. We had no idea anyone grew potatoes that large. Photo is Chuck Savage and his Seafood Stuffed Potato. When seeing the potato Dick



gave us his sage advice. "Never eat anything larger than your head".

On that trip the three of us hit every restaurant in New Orleans starting with Dookie Chase's and ending with Café Du Monde. We were looking for the best bread pudding. Nothing surpassed Louisiana Lagniappe in Destin Florida. Believe me WE SEARCHED.



Dick would winter down in Estero Florida, just outside Fort Meyers. The winter after my father passed, I was sad and full of stress. Dick invited me down for an Everglades fishing trip with guide Capt. Kevin Mihailoff, to fish for tarpon and snook. It was my first trip down to experience and fish the everglades. I remember the first 5 minutes in that flats boat, buzzing thru the Everglades, warm wind on my face, orange and blue dawn sky with the sun just rising over the mangroves, all the

sadness, stress just melted away. We didn't catch tarpon, spooked some, but found plenty of cooperating snook. Kevin's favorite fly for snook was a Krebbs Popper weedless (look for it under Gary Krebs Popper on YouTube). It is a fantastic popper for fishing lilly pads for freshwater bass and a tiny version is my go-to fly for panfishing. You can cast it into the mangroves (or weeds or lilly pads) and it won't hang up, twitch it out onto the water and wait for the explosion. I should mention that Dick was also quite an accomplished photographer. These are two photos Dick took with my SLR camera, my "reaction" to a snook hitting the popper. I think these photos encompass everything that gets a fly fisherman's blood flowing, "THE MOMENT" the fly line gets tension and the hook gets set.

On our third trip to Destin, Dick and I paired up for a red fish trip with our guide down towards Panama City. It was about an hour drive down there with the guide trailering his flats boat. Fishing was slow and quite cool for a Florida morning. Dick's time came to step up on the small platform on the bow of the flats boat to sight fish for the reds. (Dick had a major heart attack when he was in his 40s and at about 70 or so his friends kind of watched out for him.) I took my position up behind Dick to help stabilize him on the platform. It took me about a half a second to realize his second foot wasn't going to make it onto the platform and there was no way in hell I was going to stop what was about to happen. Next thing I know the guide is yelling "get the rod before it sinks". Spitting salt water out of my mouth and standing in about 3 ½ feet of marsh I got the rod and got Dick. We BOTH went head over heels off the flats boat into the water. Pat, our guide, said "Well that's never happened before. I never lost one client, let alone two."

Dick and I got back into the

boat... I have no idea how... sat... decided our course of action. Dry off and continue fishing. Photo is of one of Dick's red fish later that day.

Dick was a talker (an understatement) and on our drive back to the condo with the guide I am saying to myself "we gotta come up with a story or excuse or alibi for falling out of the boat". But Dick and the guide talked the entire drive back. So as the three of us entered the condo, Dick and I head in, mouths shut, tails between our legs, made a bee line to our rooms to get our cash to pay the guide. Chuck and John said "SO HOW DID YOU DO?" Pat our trusty guide ratted us out without missing a beat "Well AT LEAST I DIDN'T FALL OUT OF THE BOAT". BUSTED. (At Dick's wake we shared fishing stories with Dick's family. I asked his daughter "did you hear about the time Dick fell out of the boat". Without blinking she replied "WHICH ONE?". Apparently he had "experience".)





# TVTU Fly Tying Classes Start Saturday, October 29th to December 3rd, 2022

Thames Valley TU will be conducting Fly Tying classes this Fall. Bob Walsh, John Preston, and Jack Balint will be teaching the classes. The classes will be held 11 am – 1 pm Saturdays at the Fish Connection, 127 RT12, Preston, CT. Tentative class dates are October 29, November 5, 12, 19, 26 and December 3rd.



Classes are open to members (young & old) and to the public... beginner to experienced fly tiers welcomed. Tools and materials will be available if you don't have any. There are no fees for the classes and materials. Classes will be limited to 10 participants.

As in the past we will cover old/new, dry/wet, fresh and saltwater patterns. Every fly guaranteed to fool and catch fish! We will also entertain patterns that our students want to learn... anything from #2/0

streamers, #8 foam hopper, #24 Trico spinner, or whatever is hot!

#### Why learn to tie flies?

Fly tying is great way to learn some of the finer points of fly fishing; something to do off-season and keep focused on fishing; because you like being creative & working with your hands; and you want to spend many hours alone or with friends doing a fun hobby. Also, there is great satisfaction catching a fish on your own fly. Another reason people tie is to save money. How many \$3 plus flies have you lost in the trees or snagged on the bottom of a stream or the hundreds of flies in your many fly boxes? But I would say, the jury is still out on that.

But one sure way to save money for sure is to take a fly tying class. This way you can determine if this hobby is for you before you shell out to buy the necessary equipment and materials to get started. There is nothing better than learning by personal instruction. Learning from a book can be hard but not impossible. Nowadays, I would suggest using online videos might be a good alternative.

So, if you think you would like to give it a try. Enroll in our fly tying class. It's fun and you will meet some great people and future friends... and have something that gives you pleasure for a lifetime!

# **Open Positions**

TVTU is in need of some volunteers to help keep the chapter active. We need volunteers for the following Board of Director positions:

<u>President</u> – The President shall serve as general executive officer of the Chapter and shall appoint the chairs of all Chapter committees. The President shall oversee all activities of the chapter, preside at all membership and board meetings, manage the business and affairs of the Chapter. The President may sign and execute in the name of the Chapter all contracts, agreements, and other obligations of the Chapter subject to approval of the Board. <u>Secretary</u> - The Secretary keeps the minutes of all meetings of the Board and the membership, and is the custodian of all official records of the Chapter


<u>Program Director</u> - Coordinates monthly meetings including meeting speakers and other chapter activities.


