President's Message....

Greetings all!

At the January meeting, I spoke about the resurrection of the Oil Mill Road solar panel project and the recent discovery of two additional projects, one in Canterbury and one in Plainfield. My understanding is that there is a much larger number of these installations in the pipeline. You should be aware that we are strongly opposed to these projects when they involve large scale clear cutting of forested areas and a

negative impact to waterways, particularly those supporting trout habitats. See the October newsletter for the impacts of a recent installation in East Lyme. While I'm still a big supporter of solar energy, any installation must take into account a multitude of considerations to ensure that they don't cause other detrimental environmental impacts.

Unfortunately, we face an uphill battle right now as current rules and regulations do not provide for sufficient review and controls to adequately protect sensitive environments. The CT Siting Council and DEEP are working on changes to correct some of those shortcomings but it will likely take until October 1 for any changes to take effect.

We have written a letter to the Siting Council requesting a public meeting in East Lyme for residents to hear details and have an opportunity to ask questions and comment on the Oil Mill Road project. If that is scheduled, we'll get the word out and encourage you to attend and support our position. The state council is working to develop a strategy and talking points to be shared with the other CT chapters. As things develop, we'll continue to advise how you can help out. In the meantime, you can look at the CT Siting Council website to watch for news and updates.

"Water Colors"

Right now in the long dark of short February, a river is black as obsidian. Yet in the serene sky of midsummer, the same surface will be as transparent as glass. We fly fishers like to call streams crystal, chrome, silvery, golden, gleaming, gin-clear. More than one famous book title invokes "Bright." All good efforts, but we really have no word for the color of moving, flowing water. Homer called them "wine-dark seas"

but that was a long time ago, and nobody to this day knows what he was talking about. Maybe, along with "gin-clear," that tells us more about people than water. But you all know what I mean if I say "a glorious reflection, a rippling rainbow of autumn leaves."



Aquamarine, azul, azur, Celadon, cerulean, sappire, slate, sage, emerald, moss, fern, pine, olive, indigo, Teal, violet, verde. Water reflects the sky while also swallowing (absorbing) all the colors but blue and violet, thus provoking our poetic synonyms. Light is the key. Funny; there are more synonyms for "clear" than almost anything else. What color is "pellucid"? How about "limpid"? Burbling brooks release energy as water vapor, which carries negative ions for us to inhale while nearby. Yes, they really boost endorphins and relieve depression. It's hard to be unhappy while you 'go a-fishing', isn't it?



Perhaps there is a better word in some other language? Nine or ten state names come from American Indian words for water in some form. Mississippi, Missouri, Minnesota, Michigan. Dakota, Nebraska, and Ohio too. And I haven't forgotten "Quinnectuckut," our own state and long tidal river, and its smaller neighbors, the Quinebaug and the Quinnipiac.

Natchaug, Pachaug, Pomperaug. Pootatuck, Aspetuck, Shetucket.

Something besides rhyme going on here, no? (By the way, even "Yankee" is an Indian word.) "Mni Wiconi" is Lakota for "water is life". The next time you see a joyfully singing riffle, a sweeping run, a surging breaker, remember – it's the color of life.



And like life, water remains a mystery. It's a living mirror that resists definition. It conveys every color, but it's

the absence of color. Black as deep space, glaring as the sun itself. Loren Eiseley rightly suggested: "If there is magic on this planet, it is contained in water". It is hot, cold, hard, soft, invisible. That those trout too can be invisible in plain sight is thus fitting. Though incapable of movement, water is always in motion. Its color, like the rest of its nature, is too elusive for the human brain – my brain anyway. This brief and fallible "reflection" of mine is over. For now, the dream of a spring creek on a balmy June evening will have to do.

Fly Of the Month "Double Wing Rusty Spinner"

No fly-fisher should be without a Rusty Spinner. I have had many great days using a rusty spinner during all times of the day, but the

evening is usually the best time for spinners. Spinners are difficult to see since they lie flush in the surface in evening low light, especially, if you stay out way after sunset. Just keep your cast short and target a particular feeding trout. Even if you can't see your fly using a short line, keeping the rhythm and casting stroke consistent you get a feel for where your fly has landed. If there is rise and you think it was for your spinner just slowly raise your rod and you might be rewarded with TUG... but usually the fish will set the hook for you.

Last summer I had very good results experimenting with some store-bought triple wing rusty spinners during a PMD spinner fall. I liked the fullness of the extra wings to better imitate a spinner's wing. If you ever observed spinners floating by in the current... the wings are a prominent feature. Many believe the wings are a "trigger" for trout when they are determining if your offering is a natural, easy meal to

I don't have any scientific analysis to prove if this is true, but I can say they seem to out perform a regular single wing spinner. One evening my friends Steve, Chuck and I were fishing the Soda and they being a bit younger were able to get to a section before me. Of course, I got a little razzing from Chuck (the youngest, who likes to point out he's not eligible for a "Golden Age" discount where we camp) poking along while crossing the stream. I retorted we'll see how you are when you're 75+!@# My excuse for being a bit slower last year is the NO FELT rule YNP has instituted... I hate rubber soled

Recipe: Double Wing Rusty Spinner

Hook: Size 10-22 dry fly hook

Thread: Olive, rusty or color to match natural Tail: Split dun spade hackle or Mico-Fibbets Body: Fine dubbing rusty color or color to match natural

Thorax: Fine dubbing rusty color or color to match

Wings: Clear/white Zelon, HI-Viz, FTD Dry Fly Crinkle Hair, or Poly (I am experimenting w/ wing material)

Keep the body thin with a pronounced thorax. For small flies just use thread for the body. Don't overdress the wings but not too sparse (for better floatation and visibility). In fact, there are times a heavily dress wing can be a good thing... especially in riffled currents. I like Zelon's sparkle & floatability. Tails can be split or not split (doesn't seem to matter) ... but split tails look so fine!

wading shoes (even with the studs). Someone is going to have a bad mishap some day!

Since they were occupying the pool, I whet around the bend doing a little RECON with an Iris Caddis with limited success... nice looking pool though, I'll have to try the next time. So, I joined the two young whippersnappers and took a spot at the very end of the pool. I noticed that spinners were forming above us and put on a #16 rusty triple wing spinner. After a while the spinners started to fall on the surface the feed was on... Now for the next 45 minutes or more we proceeded to haul in 40 or more

Cutthroats. Without breaking my arm, I have to pat myself on the back that the triple wing out performed (by a good margin) the regular spinners. Chuck (who is a very good angler) happen to be right next to me and occasionally cast into my area... especially, when I was hammering them. More times than not the trout would take my fly over his single wing fly.



Well that experience convinced me more prominent wings are the way to go... besides the wings look more realistic. When I got back home, I tied up a few triple wingers but they are a pain to tie so, I went to just two wings to cutdown the aggravation. The double wing spinner look just as good!

Give a double wing spinner a try... you'll too can out do those all those young whippersnappers casting around you!@#!

Recipe: Triple Wing Rusty Spinner

Hook: TMC 101 #14-24

Thread: 8/0 UNI, to match Dubbing, in this case,

Camel

Tail: White Tailing Fibers

Body: Superfine Dubbing, Rusty Brown or to match

natural

Wing: Dun Polypropylene Yarn


